An Important Message from the Trustees

As you may have heard, Rev. Dana Caldwell has submitted her resignation to serve our church. We are now in a time of transition while we decide what to do next as a congregation. That process has already started. A church meeting with Michael Jones, an Associate Pastor of the Northwest Conference took place March 28th with approximately 25 church members in attendance. Michael shared with us what our next steps could be, and it was decided at this time not to consider an interim Pastor, but to continue Preaching the Gospel with a rotation of church members. You can read more about that arrangement in the commentary below. It was also decided to take a step back, do some personal contemplation and prayer and start this process in earnest after the June Mission Trip with a small team reviewing the existing Church Profile then moving on to putting together a search committee for a called pastor. In the interim, we must remember that our church is ultimately led by Jesus Christ, the Good Shepherd, so we are not without any pastor (pastor means shepherd in case you hadn't thought about that).

We know what we have to do at this time:

Preaching the Gospel. We have several members who will share this task including Chad Leonard, Abby Betzold, Colleen Kwong, Barry Tulkki and Adam Tulkki. The Diaconate can also obtain supply pastors from a list available through the NW Association of the UCC. We currently have preaching covered for all Sundays through June. If you are interested in making even a brief testimonial at a service about what your faith has meant to you, please contact Barry Tulkki.

Chris Lindee continues to be the director of music, so come and sing together, and let her know if you want to do any other musical performances at our worship.

Visiting the sick or distressed. Nyla Anderson of the Diaconate has agreed to be the point person to make sure anyone in hospital care, congregate care, sick at home, or in need of Pastoral Care get attention from our church members. You can contact Nyla at 715-554-3297. The Diaconate sees this as their role—they may ask others to do some visiting or calling. We are all part of the Body of Christ. If you know of people who need pastoral care, call the church office 715-268-7390 or Nyla.

Connecting with Youth. Abby Betzold is our Youth Coordinator and continues to work on providing programming for our youth. She may call on you for help.

Staying Connected with each other. This is a time to stick together, worship together, and talk to each other. The church is not the building; it is the inhabitants!

Mission Team is still going strong.

The Unseen Pain: A Grandparent's Heartache When Their Child Gives Up a Baby for Adoption By Rae Wooldridge

On the Saturday before Mother's Day, my daughters, Amy and Traci, and I attended a brunch to honor birth mothers. Amy and I were there to support Traci who had placed her child for adoption. The panel of speakers consisted of young women sharing their experiences of choosing adoption to provide a better life for their babies and to allow themselves to move forward with their lives.

Notably absent were testimonies from another group of women—those like Traci, who dealt with mental health issues and addiction. While there remains considerable stigma associated with mental health illnesses and addiction, it was far more pronounced 40 years ago. During that time, depression was rarely recognized in children, let alone bipolar or borderline personality disorders. Traci did not give up her baby so she could move forward, she placed her baby because she was afraid of herself and doubted her own future.

Also notable to me is there were no testimonies from grandparents. The decision to place a child for adoption can be one of the most challenging choices parents face. However, the emotional ripple effect extends beyond the immediate parents, deeply affecting the grandparents, who often experience their unique form of grief and loss. I really think this is an important issue to be addressed at future events.

When a child informs their parents—the soon-to-be grandparents—that they are considering adoption, the news can be profoundly distressing. Even as they acknowledge the altruistic nature of the choice, grandparents often imagine a future that could have been filled with the joy and love of their grandchildren. While I felt great pride in my daughter for knowing that she was not ready or able to give up her alcohol and drugs, I still had the longing to hold my first granddaughter, watching her staring steadily at me to memorize the features of someone who would always make her feel safe and loved. I imagined her sweet, milky breath and the scent of Johnson and Johnson baby shampoo. Realizing that I would not witness her milestones or be able to do some grandparental over indulging of my granddaughter was heartbreaking. I would miss supporting and encouraging her through life challenges and showing her unconditional and unending love.

As the reality of the adoption decision sets in, grandparents like my husband and myself, may grapple with profound feelings of loss and grief. These emotions can be akin to be eavement, as they mourn the loss of a relationship that will never fully develop. The anticipation of bonding with a new grandchild, sharing family traditions, and watching the child grow disappear, leaving an emotional void.

A common yet seldom-discussed emotion among grandparents in this situation is guilt. They may question their own actions, wondering if different choices could have prevented this outcome. This self-blame can be compounded by societal expectations and perceived judgment from others. Grandparents may feel isolated, struggling to find a safe space to express their feelings without fear of criticism. I never did seek or receive much needed help in dealing with these emotions because it took years to bring up the subject without breaking down into uncontrollable, ugly, snot running down to my shoes, sobbing. I know there was a couple out there who was given an incredible gift, but it was certainly at an emotional cost to our family.

Traci managed to overcome her addiction through prayer and her faith in God. She continues to manage her mental health issues day by day. I know she feels the loss of her daughter and often fears that her child does not want to find her due to possible harsh judgment picked up from the attitude of the adoptive parents. I worry that the mental health disorders, inherited from both our families, could have manifested in Traci's child. If so, I wonder how the adoptive parents handled it. Were they supportive and understanding? Is my grandchild still alive? Is she happy? I am 80 years old and the chances of knowing the answers to these questions are slim and getting slimmer as every year passes – as does the chance of ever holding my granddaughter and being able to tell her I never stopped loving her.

It has been approximately 40 years since Traci decided to place her baby for adoption. I hope her faith helps her cope and that she understands that her decision provided a blessing to a couple unable to conceive on their own. God used Traci in a special way. I hope her emotional scars, while never completely healed, have faded and softened. I pray that she understands the pride I feel in her.

My wound, however, must keep a tough, tough scar. One that never opens. If it did open, even a little, I am certain my heart would fall out.
