A Reflection on Suicide upon my nephew's completion of suicide April of 2015

My mother died when I was 15, my father when I was 20. I was carrying around a lot of unprocessed grief. I was emotionally stuck in survival mode. I had made many conscious and subconscious decisions since my mother's death to isolate myself. I didn't realize I was reacting in a protective manner out of fear of suffering another loss, any loss.

I was graduating from college and my 21st birthday was coming up. There was no one attending my graduation and there was no one anticipating the celebration of my birthday. I lived in an apartment off campus. I had no job. I had no sense of place. There was no longer a "home base" I felt I could go to, to collect myself, find a job and help me make the transition to standing on my own two feet. I felt weighed down by the obligation to soon be repaying student loan debt. I felt exhausted and so very old at 21. Life was hard, really hard. As my future stretched out before me, it was overwhelming to think of continuing on with the burdens I carried. I only wanted to be set free from the weight of my pain. It also "appeared" life was easy for other people. They were in relationships, they were finding jobs, and they had the clear presence of people who loved them in their lives and who celebrated milestones of graduation, 21st birthdays, and even engagements with them. I was not in a sustaining loving relationship. I was in communication with one brother but I needed" o much more emotional support than that relationship could

provide. There were a number of other family dynamics that added

to the complexity of my suffering. There are really no words to describe the depth of pain and despair I felt at that time in my life. The day I contemplated ending my life, I really wondered why I was created at all. I prayed to God, sharing my pain. I felt like I was worthless and could be cast away like trash. No one would miss me and I would not have to feel the pain anymore. I was standing on "the edge" about to decide to step off, when I believe God responded to my prayer. I envisioned the face of to withdraw (while at times it is still self-care to a friend and heard their familiar voice say, "God doesn't make junk!" I listened. The beauty of all creation came to mind and it resonated with me. It made sense to me that I was not junk. I realized I was made for a purpose. I had yet to discover what that purpose was. In that moment I stepped back from the edge of that possible fatal decision. I chose life. The battle was not over but in that moment I received what I needed to keep going until I was clear of the darkness around me.

As I write I am aware that I still, upon occasion, struggle with the value of my life, even if I know I have a purpose and that I am living out that purpose. When those feelings or thoughts surface I take them to God in prayer, and I trust the value he has for my life. Literally I would not be alive today if it were not for God's relationship with me.

A friend reminded me of the story of Legion, in the Gospel of Mark chapter 5. A man was living in darkness, in the tombs. He could not be subdued. He threw himself about and was

bruised. He was possessed by demons; his name, Legion, indicated there were many that tormented him. Jesus sent the demons out and Legion was healed but he was still bruised and there would still be scars of the many injuries he sustained over the years. I have such wounds. I intentionally worked not to find myself "there" again. I recognize the importance of community, for me that eventually was to be found in the Body of Christ.

I now push through my introverted tendencies do so) by reaching out, intentionally sharing where I am, what I am thinking, and what I am feeling. It's an ongoing balancing act to manage my need to withdraw while ensuring I don't withdraw too far or too long. Some would describe me as "fiercely" independent. I would propose that while I may be wired that way, the traumas I experienced when I was a youth forged a sense in me that I had to protect myself and be self-sufficient. I felt so alone in my journey. At times when I might need to ask for help, I simply don't, because while I would offer it to others...a wound that remains is that I struggle with expecting anyone to help me. When people respond in helpful loving ways, it means so much to me.

It is clear God continues to work on healing in this area of my life, as I am completely dependent on asking for help from group of people who are my dog care team as I make my way through graduate school. Also historically ministry requires I ask people to come along side me and to help me serve others.

Tragically, on March 28 2015, one of my nephews committed suicide. Unfortunately, I do not know his story of pain. I don't know what brought him to the edge and drove him to step off it to end his life. I can only say I have experienced nor angels, nor rulers, nor things present, nor a pain like that. I know it is not a sudden decision. The battle of choosing life or death is a prolonged one. He was carrying a great burden for some time. I now stand on the other side of suicide, experiencing a different kind of pain as part of the Revised Standard Version (NRSV) family grieving in the wake of his loss.

Some faith traditions suggest that suicide is an unforgivable sin. I do not believe that. I realize this is supported by suicide being classified as our fullest act of free will, not trusting God with the possibilities in our future. When I consider the great vast love of God, his complete understanding of who we are, and the gift and protection he provides of our free will, I conclude he knows there is a risk some of us will make that suicide decision. I believe that God's intention is for us to be in relationship with him. I believe we each have a unique place in God's plan and it is important that we reach the (Paragraph 161 N) fruition our journey on earth, working in cooperation with God toward the salvation of the world. I believe that heaven is a place of no more pain, no more sorrow and where suffering....A Christian perspective on suicide every tear will be wiped away. I can think of no better place for those who feel such deep despair to find welcome and loving understanding than in the arms of God.

I am to care as much about strangers as my own sister,


respect opponents no less than my own brother, honor people so unlike me as my own mother.
